Minister's Notes:

A New Day

After a tense election season, in which the divisions between Americans seemed to be drawn even more sharply, we elected as our President the first African American to hold that office.

Pundits have said that it was the bad news about the economy that sent Barack Obama over the top, or that it was Obama's message of change during an unpopular Republican administration.

I believe, though, that people responded to their desire for our leaders to do business in a new way, one that doesn't involve strife and contention, that instead attempts to arrive at solutions that involve everyone concerned.

Obama appealed to our desire to come together. Early on election night in Grant Park, one (white) spectator was discovered to be a Republican. He had purchased a ticket for \$150 over ebay. The interviewer asked him why a Republican would want to be there. He said (I'm paraphrasing), "It's an historic moment. I wanted to be part of it." He was smiling.

One television reporter, speaking from an Eastern historically black college, described how the students waited, somewhat subdued, even as large and important states like Ohio went for Obama, as if they did not trust that he could win, afraid that the election would be stolen. When the election was finally called, their exuberance burst forth, and they poured into the courtyard of the school, dancing and leaping and shouting.

It was moving to see a late election-night interview with Walter Fauntroy, veteran civil rights activist and former aide to Martin Luther King, where people had gathered at his New Bethel Baptist Church in Washington DC to watch the returns and wait. Fauntroy spoke about King's dream realized, how far we had come.

And John McCain revealed the good and gracious man he is in his concession speech, in which he shushed the boos of his supporters when he mentioned Obama's win, not once but twice. But their own good hearts were revealed in their applause when McCain spoke of our history, the "cruel and prideful bigotry" of earlier times, and how proud we can be at this historic moment.

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Minister's Notes, cont'd

It is a time of relief – a time for rejoicing – a time for hope. There will be time enough later to press for the contents of our dreams, to hold our leaders accountable for the hopes inspired in this election. Along with our new President, it is time to roll up our sleeves and get to work creating the world we want to live in.
