Minister's Notes: Waiting for Love to Be Born

Christmas – even in its most commercial aspect – still contains that magical element of waiting, the essence of Advent. Our intern Seth Fisher gave a beautiful Advent sermon last week, in which he introduced the "parable of the pizza."

"Advent" comes from the Latin *adventus*, from the Greek *parousia*, which actually carries several meanings – not just "coming at some future time" which is how most of us have looked at the idea – but also means "arrival," and even "presence."

But, says Seth, imagine you phone for a pizza – then you turn to your roomies and say, "It's coming!" The pizza is in process – it will be here presently. *Adventus*. Some impatient soul asks, "When is it coming?" It's coming at 8pm (or whenever it gets here). *Adventus*. A different meaning for "It's coming."

We sing one of my favorite Advent hymns, "People, Look East": People, look east, the time is near Of the crowning of the year... People, look east and sing today: Love, the Guest (the Rose, the Star), is on the way.

Love is on the way. Adventus.

During Advent, we say together,

We are waiting for love to be born. We are waiting with hope for peace to arrive. We are waiting for a rebirth of justice and joy in the human heart.

When will Love be born in the human spirit?

Sometimes it seems like it will never happen – we read about suicide bombings in Kabul, we see people on talk shows spew vitriol about those they disagree with, we hear about shootings right in our own neighborhood. When will the violence stop?

Sometimes it's easy to forget the third meaning of *parousia* – presence. Love is on the way, Love is arriving, Love is here – already present!
