Minister's Notes: Three Worldviews Rev. Jean Siegfried Darling

One of the exciting things about our era – in spite of all the insecurities it arouses, as well – is that some of the old ways, that have become as stiff and uncomfortable as an old pair of work gloves, are starting to crack open – more like a seed in a thick husk – and something new is growing out of the casing of the old.

Theologian Marcus Borg, one of the voices for this "something new," describes three worldviews – ways of thinking about our faith – that result in widely varying internal psychological states. In the first, a person sees the Universe as an essentially dangerous place.

In the second, perhaps a Deistic view, a person sees the Universe as a cold and indifferent place, like a machine that simply follows the laws of physics.

In the third, a person sees the Universe as suffused with benevolent spirit, with a welcoming, loving presence.

The first two, Borg says – believing in a dangerous or indifferent Universe – by their nature do nothing to dispel the existential anxiety that comes with being human (from, among other things, our prehistoric fear of being eaten). But the third – believing in a loving Universe – engenders a sense of trust, of safety in the midst of whatever comes our way.

Borg is saying – to oversimplify a bit – that what we think affects how we feel. If we continue to think theological ideas that make us feel insecure, we are doing ourselves and God a disservice. We harm ourselves, and are selling God short.

Religion needs to be living and breathing, supporting vibrant life, and not engendering fear and anxiety. We need religious practices and ideas that help us live today, that help us confront, with hope and determination, the constant pressures and problems facing us in our lives and in this world.

People have been staying away from traditional churches in droves. And in Borg's view, it's because the churches have clung to old worldviews that only added to people's anxieties.

Minister's Notes, cont'd

Thirty, forty years ago many people still shared those old views. Now more people want to see the world as a place where all people are connected, where women have a valued place alongside men, where race and class and sexual orientation are not something God would care about, where people should be free to explore the depth and breadth of their spiritual life with curiosity and passion.

I'm seeing less tolerance for handed-down truths, more interest in learning spiritual practices, more willingness to accept others' traditions as legitimate.

I cherish my naïveté, if that's what it is -I believe we are moving toward greater consciousness, little by little. And I believe that is the goal of all the world's religions, at their heart.

Beginning in September, we plan on serving meals to 40 to 60 people in our **new lunch space** in 3 ½ West, a pleasant sunny room a half flight up from the third floor. We're putting in plumbing, bumping the electrical to 220V, adding some kitchen equipment, and are buffing the room up a bit. Besides the cost of improvements, we are expanding the staffing needed, employing some of those formerly homeless folk. A generous grant from Divine Word Mission is getting us partway to our goal, but your donation is also much needed to make this dream a reality.

Our new lunchroom will provide four new opportunities a week for teams of people to help with the meal. In the past, Isaac has managed the downstairs with some regular volunteers from among the guests, but now we'll need twice as many people to work upstairs, serving meals and putting things back in order at the end.
