#### Minister's Notes: To Question is the Answer Rev. Jean Siegfried Darling

I grew up with a faith that some people question is a "faith" at all. Some people even say things like, "Oh, Unitarians can believe anything they want to." It's true that we don't prescribe what people should believe about the unknowable – life after death; heaven and hell; the nature, even the existence of God.

But this religion is ethically based – that is, what you **do** in this life is important. The Golden Rule covers the basics – you empathize with others, and don't do anything to them that you wouldn't want done to you. This carries forward into working for public policies that protect minorities and those whose voice is not heard; policies that promote fairness, that make the playing field level.

Many of our members, as children in other faiths, asked too many inconvenient questions of their religious leaders and were chastised for it. Unitarian Universalists have been known for facing authority with "attitude," summed up in that lapel button that reads "Question Authority."

One of the songs in our hymnal concludes with these words: "Even to question, truly is an answer."

Growing up with this – almost extreme – sense of doubt was not always helpful. I was taught to doubt because of my parents' rejection of authoritarian instruction – and for years I questioned everything.

It has taken a lot of soul nurturing to develop trust.

But now at Peoples we are engaging in a process that relies on questions. It's called Appreciative Inquiry – and as the name implies, it begins with appreciation, it begins from an assumption that positive qualities can be found in any sort of situation, and they can be found by asking questions.

We are discovering that the kind of questions we ask one another can help us arrive at truth – the truth of our congregation, of its members, its history. But even more, the kinds of questions we ask can determine whether we look forward with enthusiasm, or look backwards with longing; whether we will cling to a past long gone or carry forward with us into the future the best of what came before.

#### Minister's Notes, cont'd

It's exciting to be embarking on this process – we are hopeful that we will engage everyone in this quest of discovery, that people will learn a lot about this church and one another in these on-going conversations, that we will find new reasons to be together, and we will eventually discover where we are going.

It's a process nurturing in itself – instead of *kvetching*, we are looking for things to celebrate! Instead of focusing on problems, we are finding the best of what was and engaging our most creative energies towards the future.

It's a process that builds on us humans, made in the image of God; it's a process that counts on a God who is working with and through us in creating a new world; it's a process that allows us to embrace the best of who we are and can be.

It's a process of questioning, not out of suspicion, but out of appreciation, out of curiosity and caring about our fellows in this project that is the church. Sometimes to question truly is the answer.
