### Minister's Notes: My Summer Vacation

I'm an urban girl – I like the city. But I had a chance to spend a few days with several friends out west and experience being in nature and away from the sirens, the traffic, the press of people on the el. We looked at the Milky Way, its vast swath of stars sweeping across the night sky, saw our friends Cassiopeia – the constellation that looks like a "W" – and Orion (early in the morning) and Scorpio's curving tail of stars, low on the horizon.

We picked up rocks that looked like arrowheads, and once in a rare while a painted potsherd from hundreds of years ago. We were surprised by a snake crawling up between the wall and the open door – not a rattler, fortunately – and took apart a log-pile (a favorite rattler hang-out) carefully, with rakes and lots of banging about.

It was a welcome respite.

But we also read two daily newspapers and had fractious arguments with our friends about guns and the death penalty and the future of the human race. If at times a cause of raised voices, it was still fun.

These sometimes heated conversations reminded me, though, as we approach the tenth anniversary of September 11<sup>th</sup>, that it is sometimes hard not to feel discouraged at the direction we humans seem to be going. This Sunday we will reflect on those terrible events and their aftermath, with "Memories and Forgiveness" the sermon topic.

And Sunday afternoon, we hold another in our interfaith series for the Treasures of Uptown, with Jewish, Muslim and Christian/ Unitarian Universalist perspectives on "The Golden Rule" – how does our faith address issues of forgiveness and reconciliation, and how do we respond personally to this sometimes difficult challenge?

I'm looking forward to bringing you other thoughts and reflections from my time out west, particularly having heard speakers on the idea of evolutionary consciousness – Rev. Michael Dowd, the author of *Thank God for Evolution*, and his wife Connie Barlow,

author of *Green Space, Green Time*. They see the world from the kind of larger perspective that helps us, too, see that we are just one small part of something so magical, so wonderful, that awe is the only possible response.

When we get depressed listening to or reading the news, we need to return to the places of ultimate meaning – whether it is our Bible, nature, poetry, art or philosophers. To be continued! peace, Jean
