When my sister lived in Hawaii, she noticed quite a number of people – haolis (anglos), all – who had invented new names for themselves, and even new histories. Something about the atmosphere of the islands seemed to invite people to become someone other than who they started out as.

I also heard recently about a long-time minister who had served his congregation well, but was discovered to have invented his degree and ordination. He had certainly invented a new past for himself, one I thought astounding. "Well," said one of my colleagues, "he must have felt called to ministry, but just didn't want to jump through all the hoops."

This season of Easter, of the Spring Equinox, invites us to think about rebirth and renewal. It's hard to imagine now, but soon green shoots will sprout from the now frozen ground, and crocuses bloom. After the Equinox, which happens to closely coincide with Easter this year, the sun will shine more hours of the day than night looms. With Easter, Christians celebrate the Resurrection of Christ, that powerful symbol of rebirth and renewal.

So, musing on these examples, I wondered: Is it possible to remake ourselves, without being "phony"?

It is hard not to see someone that way who shucks the name she was born with to become "Orchid Ocean," who no longer was born in lowa, whose parents and grandparents are transported from tenders of farmland into more glamorous fields. It is far worse to think of a colleague who has only pretended to have the same experiences in training for the ministry as I have. (Actually, it makes me smile – but for his congregation it was no laughing matter!)

These are extreme examples. Who hasn't heard the expression, "Fake it till you make it"? It is advice most of us have **cont'd...**

needed, to get to a point where our new job, or some other new role, feels natural.

But we may start out life in a family that has expectations that don't fit who we are, and it may take a lifetime of exploring, of trying out new personas, before we finally know our real selves.

It can be extremely difficult to change some of these patterns we learned so early. The roles we were given may seem "right" just because we've had them so long. Or we may feel it is somehow disloyal to our parents or to someone else we admired when young, to decide to change ourselves.

And some of what we may be feeling we experience not as something we choose, but that has a kind of life of its own. We are not deciding to change ourselves, but allowing ourselves to change, or to be changed.

The idea of "dying to be reborn" is one that recurs in many of the mystic traditions. It carries with it the implication of the magnitude of the change – there is no more profound change than this. What is it we are "dying to be reborn" as? What will we become? Will we still know ourselves?

It takes trust – lots of trust – to go through our own personal resurrection – to die to the old me, and be born as the one we were meant to be. But it isn't impossible. And now is the season to think it over.
